

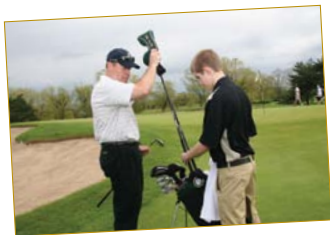
Changing the Course of a Lifetime

A Northwestern graduate, he is now a medical student at the University of Chicago. And he hasn't forgotten how he got there. "Being a doctor is my way of providing service," he says. "I want to be able to tell my patients that we're in it together."
